

Paul the Confessor November 6

Saint Paul was from Thessalonica. He became the secretary of Alexander, Patriarch of Constantinople (see Aug. 30), a deacon, and then the successor of Saint Alexander in about 337. Because of his virtue, his eloquence in teaching, and his zeal for Orthodoxy, the Arians hated and feared him.



When the Arian Emperor Constantius, who was in Antioch, learned of Paul's election, he exiled Paul and proclaimed the Arian Eusebius Patriarch. Saint Paul went to Rome, where he found Saint Athanasius the Great also in exile. Provided with letters by Pope Julius, Paul returned to Constantinople, and after the death of Eusebius in 342, ascended again his rightful throne; the Arians meanwhile elected Macedonius, because he rejected the Son's consubstantiality with the Father (and the divinity of the Holy Spirit besides).

When Constantius, yet at Antioch, learned of Paul's return, he sent troops to Constantinople to drive Paul out. The Saint returned to Rome, where Saint Athanasius also was again in exile. Constans, Emperor of the West, Constantius' brother, but Orthodox, wrote to Constantius that if Athanasius and Paul were not allowed to return to their sees, he would come with troops to restore them him-self. So Paul again returned to his throne.

After the death of Constans, however, Constantius had Paul deposed. Because of the love of the people for Saint Paul, Philip the Prefect, who was sent for him, was compelled to arrest him secretly to avoid a sedition. Paul was banished to Cucusus, on the borders of Cilicia and Armenia; a town through which his most illustrious successor, Saint John Chrysostom would also pass on his way to Comana in his last exile.

In Cucusus, about the year 350, as Saint Paul was celebrating the Divine Liturgy in the little house where he was a prisoner, the Arians strangled him with his own omophorion, so much did they fear him even in exile. His holy relics were brought back to Constantinople with honour by the Emperor Theodosius the Great.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

November is maybe my favorite month. Not only do we celebrate Thanksgiving, it's the month before Christmas, which itself is another joyous occasion to plan for. In the Orthodoxy we also plan for these two events; while

Thanksgiving is a federal holiday, the premise is that we give thanks to God for the blessings he gives us in our joys and sorrow.

We begin fasting for the Nativity on November 15, forty days before Christmas. We do it in anticipation for the coming of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Though it's not as rigorous as our Lenten fast—this fast largely encourages us to eat fish instead of meat—it nevertheless is meant to keep us hungry, both physically and spiritually, so that we can feast sumptuously on December 25, both in the Church and in our homes. In America we take a small break from this on Thanksgiving, but the following day we begin our fast again, we continue to prepare for the Feast!

But we don't just prepare *ourselves* to gather in the parish for this joyous day. For the last several years, with the leadership of Spiro Alexander, we have opened our doors on Christmas day to feed hundreds of hungry and lonely citizens in Steubenville and its surrounding towns. COVID-19 will make our 2020 celebration look different. While we wait to hear from Spiro about how different it will look, we must remember that, no matter the situation, as we give thanks to God for his coming down to earth, we are also called to love and serve those around us, no matter the situation. And for this year, it's important that we commit to that calling, however the plans shape out.

Please remember all those who are suffering around us. Remember not just the sick, but the lonely. Remember the hurt, the sad and despondent. Remember also our own sorrows and joys, and to be thankful for all of the blessings still upon us.

In the words of St. John Chrysostom "Glory to God for All Things!"



The Life and Teachings of Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica

Are you troubled by your thoughts? Are you seeking a deeper relationship with Christ and those around you?

Born in 1914, Elder Thaddeus lived through all the suffering endured by Serbia in the twentieth century. Over the course of two World Wars, during the Communist takeover, and through the NATO bombings of 1999, he co-suffered with his people. He taught, counseled, and prayed for all who came to him in pain and sorrow. His words of love and hope provided spiritual balm for people from all classes of society. In 2002 Elder Thaddeus reposed, leaving behind a large collection of his teachings, preserved by his faithful spiritual children. His life, teachings, and spiritual conversations are here presented for the first time in English.

Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Pittsburgh

OFFICE OF THE CHANCELLOR

October 10, 2020 Sts. Eulampius and Eulampia the Martyrs

To the reverend Clergy, esteemed Metropolis and Parish Council members, and dedicated Parish Secretaries of the Holy and God-Protected Metropolis of Pittsburgh,

His Eminence Metropolitan Savas, according to his prerogative as ruling Hierarch and in accordance with the amendment to the Regulations promulgated by the recent virtual Clergy-Laity Congress, is hereby extending the term of service for all current parish council, board of elections, and board of auditors members by one year.

For those whose terms were set to expire at the end of 2020, your term now runs to December 2021; for those whose terms were originally expiring in 2021, this will now happen in 2022; for those whose terms were originally set to expire in 2022, your term will now end in 2023.

Those parishes which would have normally held parish council officer elections for 2021 will still, in the New Year, have an election of officers. The priest will preside over the election, as directed in the Regulations.

Those council members not wishing to have their term extended are able to resign their position at the end of the year. The Council can (after their election of officers in the New Year) elect someone to fill the unexpired portion of the extended term as provided for in the Archdiocese Regulations (Article 25, Section 11), by the vote of the parish council based on nominees validated by the priest in the usual manner. This election is, as always, subject to His Eminence's ratification before it becomes effective.

Vacancies on the board of elections and audit committee can be likewise filled using the provisions laid out in the regulations (Article 32, Section 3 for board of elections; Article 33, Section 3 for the board of auditors).


